As more than 35% of Hondurans are unemployed, most people make a living as 'micro-entrepreneurs', selling simple goods and services. Our vision is to offer training classes in topics such as Accounting, Marketing, Computers, and English. These courses can enable people to find jobs and expand their 'micro-businesses'. More importantly, this provides a context to share the Bible with those on the periphery of the Church.

At the same time, we think this provides a viable tool for discipling those who already are part of the church. Since Melvin was flying through Chicago en route to the Shepherd's Conference in Los Angeles, Ben arranged for me to meet up with him at O'Hare Airport during my lunch hour.

A few weeks after meeting Melvin and his wife Carol in Chicago, we found ourselves having lunch together in Tegucigalpa. They spent the afternoon showing us around their city. We went up to a 'mirador' with a panoramic view of the city. What a strange thing to see the juxtaposed beauty and poverty. It certainly reminded me of how Jesus looked down over Jerusalem and wept for the spiritually lost of that city (Luke 19:41).

Besides the good time of fellowship, we felt a sense of affinity with the Zelayas. Melvin is graduating from Master's Seminary (Honduran campus) this year, and is involved in 3 church plants in and around Tegucigalpa. One of these churches meets in a public school, which feels familiar to us after years of attending church in a rented school building. We feel that God has opened a door for us to work to alongside Melvin in doing



evangelism and discipleship. We have been praying to meet someone like Melvin for a long time! Someone with a passion for teaching God's Word effectively and for the 'functional centrality' of the Gospel. Praise God for the unique way He used my friend in Indiana to introduce us to Pastor Melvin just weeks before our planned trip to Honduras. Coincidence? I think not.

Prayers and Petitions

Pray for God to be glorified as we share with believers and unsaved friends what Jesus has done for us, and why we want to move to Honduras

Pray even now that people whom we will "do life with" in Tegucigalpa would respond to the Gospel as evidenced in our words and deeds (God alone is the Lord of the harvest!)

A. Depends mostly on finances. We would like to begin our work there in either September or December of this year.


Q. Will we see you before you go?

A. We sure hope so. We plan to be in San Diego for much of July. Maybe swing by the Pacific Northwest 'on the way'? Of course, Ohio is on our radar, too. Jennifer and I love that God has called us to be His ambassadors to Honduras. We love blogging and writing to you about all the amazing things that our patient Savior is teaching us. It is a blessing for us to be able to involve people that we care about in our desire to share Christ in Honduras. We cannot do this alone, and God in His wisdom, designed ministry to be done together and not solo.

Would you prayerfully consider how you can be involved in all that God is going to do in Honduras? Here's some tangible needs that I'd like for you to contemplate:

Financial support

- Monthly financial support: we currently have 10% of our needed support pledged; per LAM's guidelines, we should not leave for Honduras until we have 100% pledged
- Start-up costs: residency costs, moving household goods, importing a car, related taxes, and air travel will require about \$11,500
